I DON'T NEED TO RIDE A HORSE (THANKFULLY)

I've been reading about our country's library history and was focusing on the time period from 1934–1943. It was one of the most difficult time periods to live in especially in rural Appalachia. The Great Depression had plunged the nation into poverty, and Kentucky—a poor state made even poorer by a paralyzed national economy—was among the hardest hit. During the Depression, food, education and economic opportunity were even scarcer for Appalachians. In 1930, up to 31 percent of people in eastern Kentucky were illiterate. They also lacked the books for distribution to those who could read.

US President Franklin D. Roosevelt enacted what was termed “The New Deal”. It was a series of economic, social and political reforms that ran from 1933–1938. Overall it was his administrations response to the problems presented by the Depression. One of those initiatives was called The Pack Horse Library. Through the Works Progress Administration, WPA, it sent librarians to deliver reading materials into Eastern Kentucky. Because the state did not have enough highways for the librarians to use they travelled by horseback into some of the most remote sections of Eastern Kentucky.

I learned this was not the first attempt to get books into the hands of a very rural and poor population. In 1913, a Kentuckian named May Stafford solicited money to take books to rural people on horseback, but her project only lasted one year. Another project instituted in the late 1920's was from the local Berea College. They sent a horse-drawn book wagon into the mountains, but that program had long since ended by 1934 when the first WPA-sponsored packhorse library was formed.

The Pack Horse initiative required help from local people as it sought out local places to house the library and store the books. Communities offered up churches and post offices as public spaces to hold the books and librarians manned the buildings called “outposts”. They gave the books and other reading materials to the carriers while keeping records of what reading material went out to each pack horse carrier. Besides books there were magazines, cookbooks, local newspapers (although old by the time they were received), Sunday school materials, textbooks and town announcements. The items usually came from donations. Once the librarians received the donations they repaired any pages & binding to help preserve them for future use. When materials became too worn to circulate, they turned them into new books. They pasted stories and pictures from the worn books into binders, turning them into new reading material. Recipes were very popular and they made binders to circulate them. Horseback carriers rode out at least twice a month, with each route covering 100 to 120 miles a week.

We can appreciate how far we have come in the distribution of reading items to other communities. Take a look at our “holds” system. Anyone with a library card, issued free, can reserve an item from any other library and have it sent to their hometown library, usually within a week. In June our 38 member libraries filled 12,721 holds and sent them along to patrons libraries.

ADULT FICTION: EVERYTHING WAS BEAUTIFUL AND NOTHING HURT BY BEN REEVES

Travis is Death in the modern world. He wears jeans and a T-shirt and lives in a small, grey town. His job is to offer people comfort in their final hours of life. He's stoic, gentle, and a little naive, despite everything he knows. He's young and handsome, despite who he is. Each death he witnesses is meaningful to him; he listens, never judges, and most importantly, never tries to change anyone's fate. He knows that every life must eventually end to maintain the balance of the universe and he respects the cycle.

Then he meets Dalia, a midwife, and her boisterous eight-year-old daughter Layla, who live across the hall. 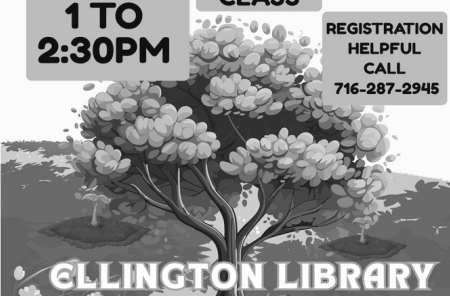

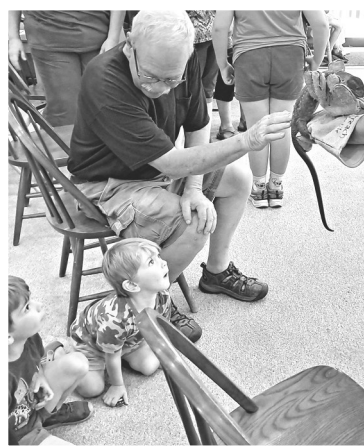

AUGUST 19 @ 6PM: Celoron Park Remembrance film presented by the Fenton History Center. Historic Celoron Park was a famous amusement destination located on the shores of Chautauqua Lake in Celoron, NY. There are still many people who have childhood memories of attending the park. Often referred to as the "Coney Island of Western New York", it operated from 1894 until 1962, featuring classic rides, a massive ferris wheel, a grand ballroom, and vaudeville shows. Established by the Broadhead family, the park boasted top-tier entertainment, a wooden roller coaster, and a 165-foot ferris wheel called "The Phoenix". Today, the amusement park is gone, but the site serves as the Lucille Ball Memorial Park to honor the village's most famous resident. The film is produced by and based on the book by Thomas J. Goodwill. The book was published in 2009 and the film produced in 2024. Mr. Goodwill is the Board President of the Fenton History Center. At this time we are hoping to have him be able to come to the film and add any insights or answer questions from the audience. Even if he cannot attend we will be showing the film. If you have any memories of the park we would welcome you to share them also.

Summer- Time for an adventure!
Check out a Day Adventure Pass from a CCLS member library for free or reduced-price admission to local partner organizations.



Use of the Day Adventure Pass is intended to serve as an introduction to each destination. The passes are not intended for repeated use by the same individual or family. Library patrons are encouraged to purchase personal memberships to cultural destinations if they are interested in frequent use. Each pass provides free or reduced admission to the destination—some restrictions may apply.

BORROWING RULES

- Borrowers must be 18 or older, a current CCLS library cardholder in good standing, and provide valid identification or library card at check-out.
- The loan period for the pass is seven calendar days
- (no renewal allowed).
- Patrons must return the pass to the checkout library no later than 11:59 p.m. on the seventh day. The pass must be returned to the outdoor book drop if the library is closed. The pass must be returned to the circulation desk if the library is open.
- Patrons must take these passes out on their own library card only.
- Patrons may check out only one pass at a time.
